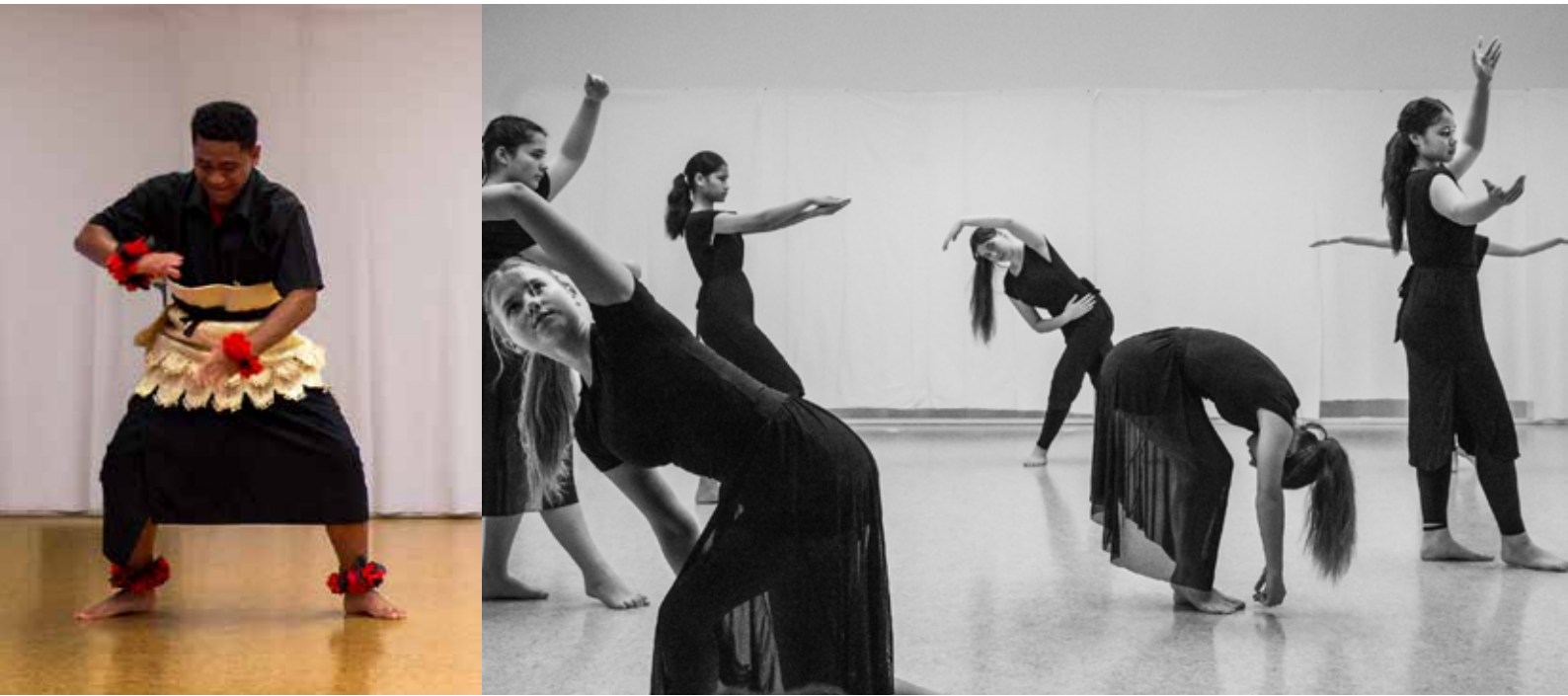

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

DANCE



THE FIRST BIG EVENT FOR DANCE AT OUR SCHOOL THIS YEAR WAS POLYFEST!

This was a great opportunity for students from across the whole school to take part in a dance festival and share their cultural knowledge. This year we awarded dance credits to students that were involved. Overall we assessed 113 years 11, 12, and 13 students for level 2 and 3 dance credits across seven cultural groups, Indian, Filipino, Cook Island, Tongan, Samoan, Niuean and Kapa Haka. Students gained 4 dance credits each, that's 448 credits given in total.

In the classroom, we have had external dancers from the industry come in to teach our students different phrases of choreography. To start with, we had Lauren Byrne from the Royal New Zealand Ballet come in to teach our level 1 dancers a piece of Sarah Foster-Sproulls choreography from the RNZB piece Autumn Ball. In contrast to this we have had Gemma Naidoo, who is a current performing artist in the industry, come in to teach Hip Hop and Contemporary phrases to our Year 10 and Level 1 students. This gave our students a broad range of dance genre experience.

As part of the Dance programme, it is important that students get the opportunity to see some live performance work. This year we took our senior dancers to see a piece of work by Black Grace Dance Company at The Herald Theatre in the city. Black Grace is a contemporary dance company founded by Neil Ieremia in 1995.

Most recently, on Thursday 14th September our Year 10, 11, 12, and 13 dance students performed at our annual Dance Showcase. This was an opportunity for students to share their assessment work from class with friends, whānau, and our local community. We look forward to putting this on again in 2024.



CAREERS

DRAMA REPORT



2023 has been a big year for the Drama Department! One stand out opportunity that we took part in this year was the Theatre Sports Youth Programme (TYP) competition. We made it all the way to the semi-finals and hosted two matches at our school as well as attended many off-site events at St Kentigern and Rangitoto College. Our team that made it through to the festival match consisted of Emerson Rockell, Cameron Ross, Jasmine Swords, Elsie Woodward, and Peter Muller. The Senior Theatresports leaders meet every Monday after school to prepare for upcoming matches as well as plan what knowledge they will be sharing with our junior teams during Thursday and Friday lunchtimes. We look forward to putting our teams forward in the TYP matches in 2024.

Every year we receive up to 20 scholarship places for our students to take part in two National Youth Theatre (NYT) productions. This year the productions were Cats! and High School Musical. Students who apply for this scholarship are triple threats and passionate about all things dance, music, and drama! This was an excellent opportunity for students to experience live theatre as well as see future pathways for themselves in the industry. As part of this experience, tutors from Auckland Theatre Company came into school and gave some pre and post show workshops with our students to better prepare them for their external exams.

We also had ex Onehunga high school student Wesley Dowdell from Massive Theatre Company come into school to run workshops with our students on physical theatre, and Alexander Holloway from The New Zealand Stage and Screen Combat School came to teach stage combat.

From the 17th to the 20th of October we hosted our biggest Drama Production yet - "Holmes and The Ripper"

directed by Zane Fleming. This took place at the Dolphin Theatre in Onehunga. It was a great opportunity for our students to experience what it is like working in a local theatre, as well as being directed by a professional actor and director in the industry, Zane Fleming.



ENGLISH

As we move past the old Covid restrictions, this year the English team has happily seen the reinstatement of some of our co-curricular activities with enthusiastic student uptake.

CREATIVE WRITING CLUB

This year saw a revival of the Creative Writing Club at Onehunga High School, providing burgeoning authors with a space to develop their skills and work on writing for pleasure and enjoyment. Students work on personal writing projects alongside their peers gaining important critical feedback in the process. In addition the club supports keen young writers to submit their stellar work to writing competitions around New Zealand such as Year 13 student Renee Huang who worked tirelessly to perfect a piece for submission to the prestigious Sargeson Prize Short Story Competition.

The Onehunga High School Creative Writing Competition ran again this year, gaining traction among senior and junior students alike. From poetry to prose, horror to romance, we are incredibly proud of the work students have put forward. To highlight the outstanding work of our ākonga, the English Department will be publishing a journal of student work so that our school community can read and enjoy their efforts. SCHOLARSHIP ENGLISH

Six Level 3 students will tackle the challenging English Scholarship exam this year. After three years of intense preparation, these scholars are ready to apply all their knowledge and critical thinking to three handwritten essays (in the space of a three hour exam!) in addition to their regular NCEA exams. Regardless of whether this year's students gain the scholarship, we are incredibly proud of the monumental efforts of these outstanding young people.



DEBATING

Students primarily join the OHS Debate Club because they enjoy a good argument, but they are also keen to practise their critical thinking and persuasive speaking skills. This year, OHS Debate Club members turned up in increasing numbers to a weekly lunch meeting to debate topics from the simple to the complex. The teams gain valuable experience working collaboratively to build logical, credible and compelling arguments. With each debate, they explore ideas that affect themselves, the communities they live in and the wider world. There is no doubt that these students develop valuable public speaking skills and experience as they build their debating confidence.

OHS English Language School hosted around 20 individual ESOL learners and more than 500 short-stay Kiwi English learners throughout 2023.

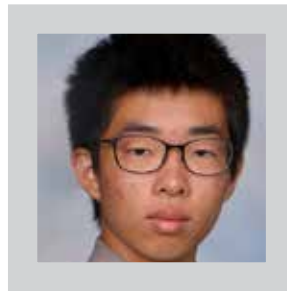

Thanks to our longstanding partnership with the Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra (APO), our Level 2 and 3 Music students were invited to watch the orchestra live at the Auckland Town Hall in May. Our APO Senior Band also continued their mentorship programme from last year to develop their musicianship and performance skills. On Tuesday afternoons, several talented musicians; Cameron Ross (drummer), Peter Muller and Alex Thrush (pianists), Elliot Wyness (guitarist), Oliver Meade (trumpet player), Nuku Uasi (horn player), Natalie Sifaheone and Aria van Dolleweerd (vocalists) were found jamming it out in the music room with the guidance of APO mentors Eric Scholes and Thea Doyle. ROTORUA TRIP-

The HOD of Social Sciences Mr Elliot Moka, Mrs Elianna Gabriel and Deputy Principal Ms Bex Muipu, accompanied twenty-five Level 3 Geography students on a 3-day trip to Rotorua, so students could gather research necessary for their internal assessment and better prepare them for their external exams.

The students were taken to Te Puia Geothermal Park including its New Zealand Māori Arts and Crafts Institute, the Rotorua Night Markets, the Agrodome, Redwoods Forest, the Luge and Gondola as well as the center of Rotorua Township for data collection. The focus of the trip was to study differences in spatial patterns of tourism development. The students collected data by counting the number of female and male tourists, estimating their ages into categories. Both students and staff thoroughly enjoyed the trip, and the teachers were impressed by the quality of work the trip inspired.
