



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YEAR IN REVIEW

As we reflect on another memorable year at Onehunga High School, it is inspiring to consider the achievements and growth of our remarkable students. This year has been a journey defined by perseverance, creativity, and success, epitomising our 65-year tradition of striving for excellence.

We embarked on the first year of our three-year strategic plan, making significant strides toward our goals. Notably, our emphasis on enhancing academic achievement through improved teaching and learning practices, as well as robust academic tracking, has led to meaningful progress for our learners. The predicted outcomes for the senior school build upon last year's gains, reinforcing our commitment to continuous improvement. From the start of my tenure, I have underscored the importance of academic results in providing our learners with choice and opportunity. It is gratifying to see our strategic vision of every student succeeding coming to fruition.

The accomplishments of our students this year have been truly inspiring. In sports, highlights include the Girls Rugby 10s being crowned Auckland Champions, the Girls Futsal team qualifying for the 2025 Nationals, and the Girls 1st XI Football team returning to the Auckland Premier Grade after a ten-year absence. Individual successes, such as Xavier White becoming the National Junior Boys Orienteering Champion, exemplify the extraordinary talent within our school.

In arts and cultural pursuits, our students excelled by reaching the Theatresports

Finals, delivering outstanding Kapa Haka and Spoken Word performances, and celebrating the inaugural Pasifika Awards Ceremony. This event, a significant milestone for OHS, was further enriched by the presence of Honourable Carmel Sepuloni, whose inspiring message reminded us that the sky is the limit. Nga Reo Rau o Te Haerenga also organised a school-wide hangi, strengthening our school's tikanga through manaakitanga and kotahitanga.

Students also demonstrated their capabilities in academic and creative arenas. They excelled in the Tournament of Minds, the NZ Economics Competition, and Creative Writing, and represented New Zealand at the World Tsunami Summit in Japan. These achievements reflect not only the talent and dedication of our students but also the unwavering support of our staff and community.

The contributions of our staff were equally noteworthy. Two members were recognised with the Fran Compton Award for their exceptional dedication to teaching and learning. Kate Crews was celebrated for her commitment to academic excellence and holistic education, while Tia Woodley was acknowledged for her innovative work in the Arts and her passion for nurturing creativity.

We also bid farewell to several valued staff members this year. Associate Principal Gareth Leadbeater transitioned to an exciting new role as Principal of MIT's Secondary Tertiary School. Since joining OHS in 1998, Mr. Leadbeater has left a lasting legacy, particularly as Head of PE and a senior leader. Ceri Cheshire, after 18 years at OHS, departed to take on the role of Deputy Principal at Pakuranga College. We are grateful for her dedication and service to the PE department and her contributions as a senior leader. We also honoured Nonette Roberts, who retired after 24 years of exceptional service as an ESOL teacher. Her warmth, expertise, and unwavering support have left an indelible mark on the lives of countless students.

This year saw significant developments in our facilities, including the opening of our refurbished hall and new science classrooms. Plans for additional enhancements—such as covered walkways, expanded seating, and a stand-alone library—are underway, reflecting our commitment to providing a well-equipped and enriching environment for learning.


To our teachers, support staff, Board of Trustees, and wider community: your





Other students toured trade schools and specialised training institutions, such as the International Travel College and Prosport, to further research tertiary study options. Many Year 12 students took up the opportunity to attend Catalyst days at Auckland University to learn more about university life and the career paths available. Our Year 13 Māori students participated in the Kei Runga Ki Mua Careers programme, a series of working lunches with inspiring guest speakers. ENGLISH



Thank you to Ngā reo rau o Te Haerenga, our Māori committee, and in particular Owen Sinclair, Wane Warehau, and the whanau kaitiaki class for providing this experience for us. Thank you also to all the people who so generously donated food.

SCIENCE & PŪTAIAO DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

It's been a stellar year for the Science/ Pūtaiao Department at Onehunga High School, packed with exploration, achievement, and hands-on learning. Our students immersed themselves in exciting field trips, from the rocky shores of Leigh Marine Reserve to the thrilling experiments at Rainbow's End, interactive exhibits at MOTAT, and rich coastal ecosystems. These experiences brought science to life beyond the classroom, sparking curiosity and a deeper understanding of the natural world.

Our team also welcomed new teachers to our science whānau, and our revamped tutorials have been bustling with enthusiastic students, leading to strong achievements across the board, and engaged well in our refreshed NCEA Level 1 curriculum. The practical science labs have been a hit, and our legendary Detective Science unit had Year 10s solving the "Case of the Stolen Arc Reactor" with forensic skills any detective would be proud of!

A highlight for our senior students was Jake Shearer, a standout Year 13 student who earned a fully funded place at the prestigious Elaine P. Snowden Astronomy School. Jake travelled to the University of Canterbury and Mt John Observatory in Tekapo to expand his passion for Astronomy. Additionally, our Pūhoro STEMM Academy students attended off-site workshops to great acclaim, showcasing the potential of our rangatahi in the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, and Mātauranga Māori. Our HSA (Health Science Academy) programme has continued to allow students to explore future career paths within the medical world. This year marked the introduction of a new badge system to recognise students' dedication and passion for pūtaiao. Our

Academy students had the opportunity to attend several Leadership Events and trips. These events, organised by the Te Whatu Ora FOU team, were tailored for each year group. It was a valuable opportunity for our students to broaden their understanding of health career pathways by hearing from health professionals, building networks with other HSA schools in the program, and developing their leadership skills.

Our Year 9s enjoyed a virtual dive into New Zealand's marine ecosystems with the Peter Blake Trust, and our Level 1 Science in Context students received an inspiring visit from the team at Sanitarium to explore nutrition.

ENVIROCLUB 2024

Our Enviroclub students have been working hard in 2024 to keep the food waste scraps out of the student cooking kitchens. A group of students volunteered and worked alongside the Food and Hospitality department and Sarah and Kristine, our Onehunga Community activators, to set up a system to collect all the food scraps. The food scraps are delivered to the Royal Oak Intermediate community compost hub where the food is turned into compost and used to grow vegetables that are used by the ROI school community. Composting is a key area for Enviroclub focus in 2024 and into 2025, with our Senior students leading a research project looking at implementing composting systems which will further support the school's green waste management goals.



Some of the other collaborative studentled projects of 2024 included, planting and weeding parts of the gully to the south west of the school grounds, participating in a Kahui Ako Youth Sustainability Leaders Forum Hui designed to foster leadership in student-led sustainability projects across our Onehunga school community, and helping out at the Onehunga Peoples' Garden with planting and weeding days. The OHS Enviroclub has also organised our own OHS school planting days at the Onehunga Peoples' Garden.

Several of our Junior students also joined the Kahui Ako Enviroschool's reflection day with neighboring primary and intermediate students to reflect upon the projects they were involved in. A highlight of the year



was our OHS Enviro Scavenger Hunt, a cryptic series of posters designed by our students and placed around the school as an educational puzzle campaign to support our student and staff community in allocating waste into the right bins.


DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD








TONGAN LEA FAKA-TONGA




CULTURAL COUNCIL















SPORTS Review


