The last three years have been challenging for us all, and some more than others, dealing with situations that have been created, or made tougher, by the COVID-19 pandemic. Last year I referred to Martin Luther King jr's words, and Faaiuga quoted these at our Services Academy march out: If you can't fly then run, if you can't run then walk, if you can't walk then crawl, but whatever you do you have to keep moving forward. It is right to again acknowledge the loyalty each of you has shown to yourself, your family and our school, to keep supporting each other, and the courage you have shown to keep moving forward. You continue to demonstrate LAC.

Change is here to stay. It is how life is now. And together, we can do it. We are doing it. Together we have worked through the demolition of half of our school and the constant redevelopment of our campus over the past three years. In particular, I want to acknowledge all of our Year 13 students - in your final year at school you have seen the major part of our redevelopment completed, and you have learned and managed your lives through a global pandemic for each of your senior years at secondary school. You are inspirational young people and leaders.

With work ongoing, but with the major part of our rebuild completed, it is timely to again thank our architects Ignite, project managers BECA, the Ministry of Education, construction company Naylor Love and Associate Principal Gareth Leadbeater, our absolutely amazing Project Lead, all who continue to deliver us a superb campus that matches the quality of teaching and learning that goes on in our school.

This is my final senior awards ceremony as principal, and I want to acknowledge the very special farewell assembly that students gifted me earlier. Thank you again so much to everyone involved, you have left an indelible print on my heart.

I also want to take a moment to share one of the many learnings from my 16 wonderful years in this role and my 30 amazing years at Onehunga High School that I hope will resonate with you. Some years ago when I was asked to speak about some of my learnings as principal, I shared

these ideas with a group who were studying leadership. My message is simple: Be yourself and back yourself, but not by yourself.

1. Be yourself

Be your authentic self – don't try to be others, the gift you have to offer the world is the gift of you. Be confident in who you are and what you have to offer. In your way. This has been the biggest lesson for me since becoming principal. Do things the way that is in accord with your style – it is not better or worse than anyone else, it is being you. It is a joy that we are all different and bring different perspectives to our lives. Embrace diversity, embrace your uniqueness and be open to learning from each other. Know that being you is special. That famous line - be yourself, everyone else is already taken.

2. Back yourself

Your bottom line is always to do what is right. Keep your integrity, keep your optimism and positive approach, keep being respectful of everyone, keep listening more than you talk (we have 2 ears and 1 mouth for a reason). Trust your gut and back yourself. Listen to that voice that is telling you what you should do, even when you are not quite sure why.

3. But not by yourself

We all know there is no "I" in "team". And that is what I want to particularly acknowledge today, this fantastic community. You are simply wonderful, our community has always been inclusive, warm and supportive. May it always be so. Because it is always about the people.

So be yourself, back yourself and connect with others so that you are not working in isolation! Thank you all for the joy and fulfilment that have been with me throughout my years in this community.

Talking about community segues perfectly into acknowledging Linda Melrose, our Adult and Community Education Co-ordinator and International Student Director, who is leaving us this year after having been here for 35 years. Linda is our longest serving staff member, having begun at Onehunga High as an economics teacher in 1988. Linda leaves an incredible legacy of achievements. As many of you know, our government funded ACE programme is the biggest of any school in New Zealand, and Linda has made it this way. She leads programmes that deliver to people in central and south Auckland and she is committed to quality lifelong learning. My biggest learning from Linda over the years has been her positive, proactive attitude. She says yes to all creative opportunities and then figures out how to do it!

The other person I would like to especially acknowledge is Christine Hallett who has taught music at Onehunga High School for 27 years, to individual students as well as choirs. Christine is one of our itinerant Music teachers. She has taught many young people across Auckland throughout her career, including people who simply want to enjoy learning and singing for pleasure as well as those for whom music and singing is their career. Thank you, Christine, for the positive difference you have made to everyone you have taught and those of us who have had the privilege of listening.

Thank you also, to all whānau, teachers, friends, former students, former parents, and community supporters. Your support of and care for our students, matters. We value our partnership with you, and we are very grateful to you.

As always, thank you to our students for your wonderful contribution. Work hard and continue to develop your gifts and talents. Follow your dreams. Be yourself and back yourself but not by yourself.

We will plant beautiful roses in our garden, in acknowledgement of Year 13 students of 2022. The dark red rose is named "Courage" and the orange rose is called "Aotearoa". We chose them because of the significance of their names and because they are beautiful. We invite you to come back and check them out, it is lovely to acknowledge you in this way, as you move on to the next stage of your life journey. 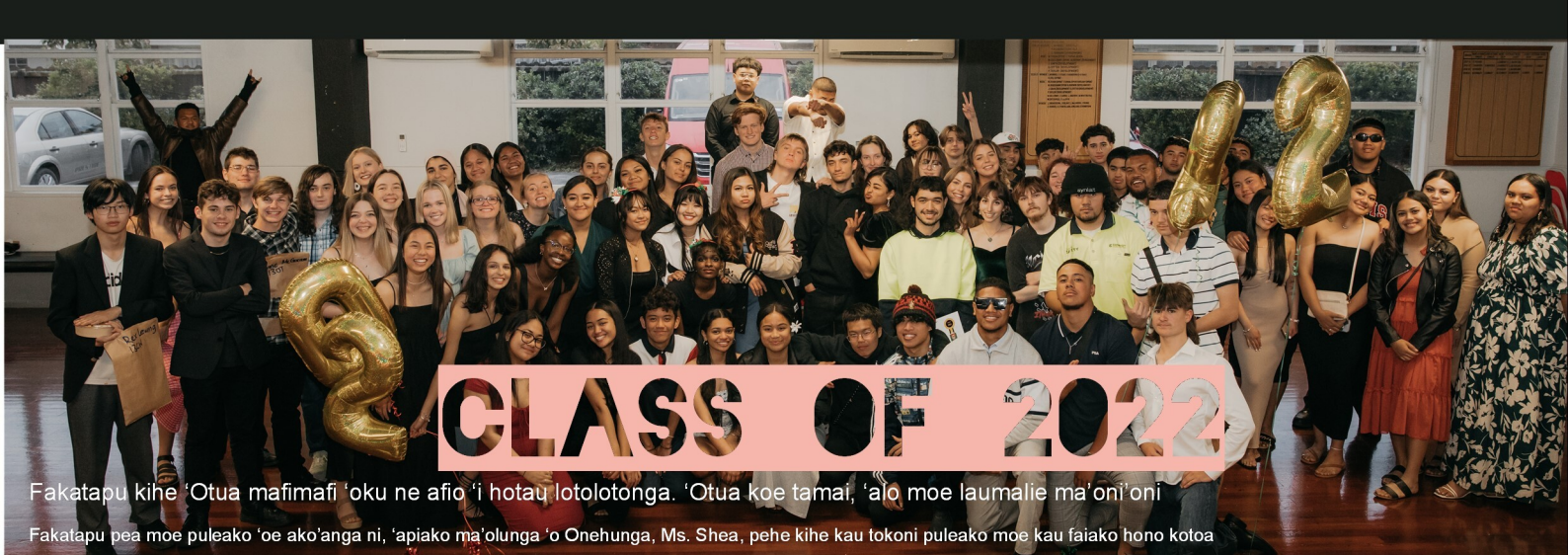

BUSINESS

2022 is a year of promises and challenges as students returned to face to face teaching and learning. At the start of Term Three we farewell our Head of Business School, Linda Everett .

After 2 -3 years of teaching with a Limited Authority to Teach she trained at the University of Auckland, while working, and attained a Diploma in Teaching. This year we opened our new building TKW and are very excited to be using this space for Science!

We have been making the most of having gas and bunsen burners available. Combustion experiments have been a highlight for many including the OHS open day hit "light your teacher on fire" demonstration also known as fire bubbles. It is lovely having practicals feature so strongly again in our curriculum. As well as chemistry and combustion experiments many have taken part in dissections. Thanks to Mr Leadbeater and the Tech Departments' new laser engraver we designed a new class of the week honors shield. This custom designed piece is on display byt the workroom and celebrates many aspects of learning, achievement, attitude and improvement. We hope your class earned the honor at least once!

Our Health Science Academy was privileged once again to meet with and be inspired by many people from different backgrounds in the medical field. Fono, workshops, virtual gatherings and trips out the various locations allowed our students to get a real insight into what life as a professional in this space can look like. Health Sciences Academy

Health Sciences Academy is a Te Whatu Ora Health New Zealand funded program aimed at increasing participation of our graduates in health service related careers. Career Exposure events include a Family Fono each term with invited speakers who are currently either studying towards health related qualification at tertiary level or who are practitioners of one of a number of health professions. Year 13 students participated in FOU Kuata each term, those events are aimed at creating connections between Health Sciences Academy students from all the schools who take part in the program and prepare students for university education.

Weekly After School Science Tutorials on Wednesday provide academic support for students in Science.

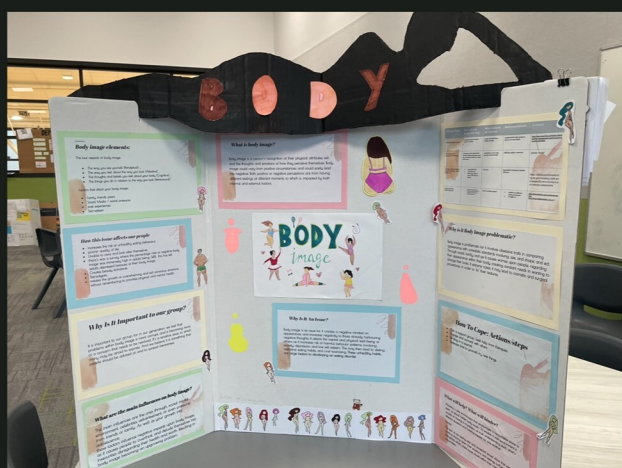


PE AND HEALTH

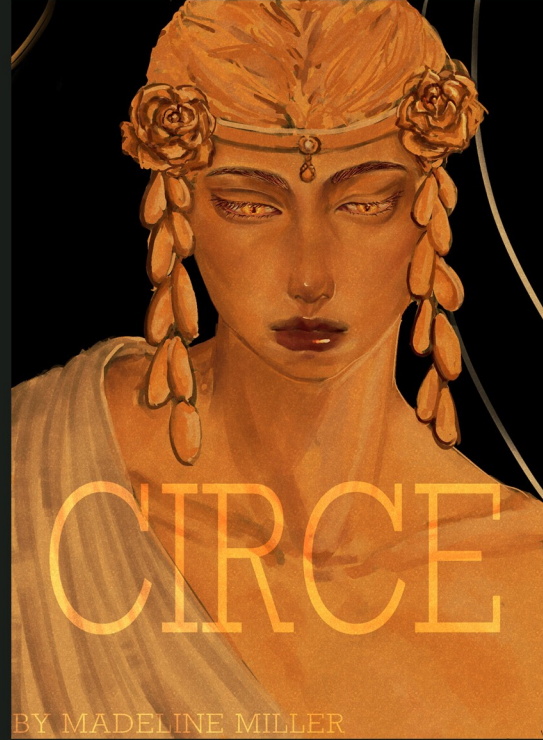
Our Junior winner, Hayden Chandler, crafted a hair-raising tale about a man's misadventure in a malevolent forest:

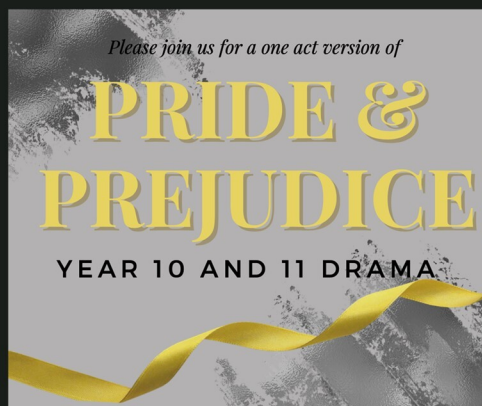

CAREERS

Connecting classroom learning with the world of work

Workplace exposure builds important connections, knowledge and confidence and it was a breath of fresh air to be out visiting businesses first-hand again this year! They welcomed groups of our students and informed them about the career possibilities in their industries. Our seniors interested in the Hospitality sector, for example, visited Rocket Kitchen's commercial kitchen, those interested in Creative media visited FCB Advertising Agency, those interested in Logistics visited Mainfreight and those interested in Tourism visited Sky City Hotel and AJ Hackett Bungy, to name but a few of the trips.

Careers Insights seminars

As well as over 250 students receiving personalised careers counselling, our weekly Careers Insights seminars helped students to deepen knowledge of different jobs. Guest speakers, from the fields our students were interested in, shared their own career stories and knowledge of pathways in their industry. Our students were able to hear from a wide range of occupations - including personal trainers, lawyers, architects, tradies, security analysts, medical imaging technologists, rugby professionals, police officers, make-up artists, pharmaceutical scientists - and many more!

Researching tertiary options

Year 13's considering further study were invited to presentations in Term 2 to learn about the unique features of different places they could study. Groups of students then visited different training providers, to ensure they were making informed decisions. In Term 3 Application workshops were held, so students could be supported to plan their courses for 2023.

Visiting tertiary institutions

As well as visiting the main universities and polytechnics, there were also visits to smaller niche providers - from the NZ School of Tourism to the Media Design School to ATC Military School - and many more! It's a great way to feel which is the fit for you, and learn just how many options are out there!

Jobseeker workshops popular!

This year saw a great uptake in the lunchtime Jobseekers workshops. Many proactive senior students learnt tips on how and where to find work, got support with CV writing and interview skills, and landed themselves part-time and holiday jobs.

Leaders of Tomorrow

Our Year 13 Māori students had the opportunity to attend the 2022 Kei a Tātou te Ihi (KATTI) leadership day and Yr 12 and 13 students The Pacific Island Leaders of Tomorrow programme (PILOT). As well as hearing from inspirational speakers and exploring tertiary study and career options, these days were a much enjoyed chance for whanaungatanga and building of networks with students from other schools.



Drivers Licence programme

In Term 2, 25 of our Year 13 students participated in a Road Code workshop and sat their learners licence test at school - with a very impressive pass rate! Students were delighted with the independence, freedom and opportunities that come with passing your drivers licence tests.

GUIDANCE

PEER SUPPORT LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME

Thirty Year 13 students were selected to take part in the program this year, chosen for their attitude, maturity and leadership qualities. They completed a full day of training in January, and then worked hard during Orientation Week, playing a central role in welcoming our new students and their whanau to OHS. They went on to spend time with their assigned Year 9 classes twice a week throughout Term One, creating strong bonds and modelling LAC values and attitudes.

This year the program required Peer Support Leaders to take their junior students through weekly challenges designed to help them express themselves, get to know each other, and learn about our LAC culture. The group were undeterred by pandemic-related limitations, continuing to fulfill their duties and creatively honour the spirit of the program even when they could not be at school.

School Counsellor Georgia Scapens said "This was an outstanding year for Peer Support, and I think that comes down to the special nature of this group of students. Each year a limited number of Peer Support with Excellence awards are presented at prizegiving, and this year we have the highest ever number of students due to receive that award. We also received more teacher nominations for Peer Support Leader of the Year than ever before. We are immensely proud of what these Year 13 students have contributed to the OHS community."

HAUORA COUNCIL

It was a relief to have the chance to get some things underway this year in the Hauora Council and to have us all at school and to feel some sense of normality.

We started off the year by making an information video to show the school what to do if you felt you had any covid symptoms. Our star 'patient' was Uluaki Fulivai Kaivelata who took us through the process from classroom to quarantine room! A big thank you to Patricia Toala for doing the filming and editing.

In Term Two we put our energy into raising money for Pink Shirt Day. The money raised went towards education against bullying at school and in the workplace. OHS got behind this and embraced their pink side! We raised \$454 – well done everyone who contributed.

We also worked alongside the Sports Council running the Breakfast Club. On a Tuesday morning throughout the term, we offered toast and cereal to those who wanted it.

We were involved in several programmes in Term Three.

Some of us attended a meeting with the Auckland Dental School to contribute to a study on Pasifika and Māori dental health. We took part in an online survey and later took part in a group seminar with the researchers.

THEATRE SPORTS

This year we took some students to a teacher and student leader workshop for Theatresports.

There are two workshop days for students and staff to start learning the skills needed to teach Theatresports in order for the students to be able to run a successful programme.

This was the first Theatresports workshop of the year. This took place on a Sunday from 10am-3pm at Rangitoto College and was a great opportunity for the students to learn about how to be a Theatresports leader as well as meet some teams from other schools around Auckland.

Throughout the year we have had a Theatresports tutor come in from the Theatresports Youth Programme multiple times.

This is an after-school programme that runs from 4.30-5.30pm on a Monday. During these workshops, a TYP tutor called Rebecca Stubbing comes in to teach the students all about how to compete in Theatresports, and some games to play during the competitions.

Some examples of games that the students learned included....

Space jump - 4 players. One player starts miming an everyday activity or routine. A second player (or the MC) calls Freeze and the first one freezes. Second player builds another scene based on the frozen position of the first player.

Hitchhiker - Four chairs are placed on the stage to represent four seats in a car. One driver starts in the car and picks up 3 different hitchhikers along the way. Each player has an emotion and as the passenger enters the car, everyone in the car has to take on that emotion. They continue dialogue until the new hitchhiker comes in. They must conclude the scene once dropping all of the hitchhikers off at the destinations.

Typewriter - One of the players is the Narrator. He has a (mimed) typewriter and starts the scene by reading aloud as he types. As soon as the Narrator has given a few elements, the players take over and start playing the scene. At any point, the Narrator can take over again, perhaps switch to another location, introduce new character, provide tilts or flashbacks.

What is a Theatresports match?

It is a 90-minute improvised comedy show with an intermission. The performance is a unique blend of traditional performance skills and bravado of sport. There are 2-4 teams of players who endeavor to spontaneously create exciting, entertaining stories, songs, poems, scenes, ballets etc. With no script, the players work together and step in to the unknown to create fun, moving, and entertaining stories. The competition takes a backseat to creating a memorable performance with stellar storytelling, great characters, and tight teamwork.

The scenes/stories are usually one to five minutes long. The teams get a suggested "ask for" from the audience, which proves that it is improvised, and also gives the team one piece of shared information. Theatresports thrives on the special energy that can only exist between performer and audience member when neither has any idea of what is going to happen next. Finally, the judges give a score and the team with the highest score is declared the winner of the match. Students are marked on storyline, technique, and entertainment factor!
