

Due to Auckland's lockdown in 2021 there was no full year photo taken of Year 13. We were however able to unearth this photo from the archives of the cohort back in 2017














My highlight was the dissection of a sheep's lung and heart as we were preparing for our internal assessment about circulatory systems!


Learning on a personal level about marine life at Goat Island while snorkelling was my highlight.

When Do Nightmares End?

Waking up from a nightmare is not in any way gentle. Your eyes might snap open suddenly, chest heaving for gasping breaths as your sweat soaked palm clutches at a suddenly far too warm duvet. Your heart might reverberate through your entire body, leaving your head banging like a drum, ears ringing and even your teeth buzzing to the rhythm. Maybe you sit up on your bed, struggling to grapple with the instinctual fear that races through you, trying to push common sense through your mind. Everything seems incredibly still, impossibly still. A long, drawn-out shudder escapes you before you can stop it, and you freeze. You certainly make an effort to take shallow breaths, eyes nearly bugging out of your head as the pressure in your skull increases. Surely your breath isn't that loud? Surely it's not that even and slow? Your mind twists and turns at a mile a minute with half baked ideas and theories. Your chest tightens, heart a ticking time bomb as your lungs still... and the steady breathing continues.

It quiets after several seconds, but you're sure, you're certain you heard it. Or did you? Your ears are still ringing, and houses creak at night, right? It's probably the wood. The breath you were holding involuntarily wooshes out of your worn out lungs, body overriding terror in a need to survive. No, you're being stupid, this is stupid, your mind is playing tricks on you. With a definitive shake of your head and a clenched fist, you force obnoxiously loud gasps of air to cross your lips and spill into the tense atmosphere like water to parched, cracked earth. A laugh bubbles forward and you let it cut the tension in half. There's nothing in the room with you, nothing, nothing, you're by yourself! You let yourself relax, body sagging, no longer a string about to snap. The drumbeat that had been reverberating through you since waking up, silences. Shoulders slowly move back from up near your ears. Eyes drop close lazily and hands reach up to massage a forehead still wet with beads of sweat. You don't notice the book fall off your desk and land gently on the carpeted floor, pushed by a small hand cast in shadow.







Understand Social Sciences

Over the course of 2021, Social Sciences students experienced meaningful learning, trips and informative guest speakers to enrich their learning experiences. This includes the Level 2 Geography students travelling to Onehunga Mall Road and Newmarket to collect data on retail patterns. Students collected statistics on retail activity types, transport types, and estimated age range and used this to help discuss factors such as gentrification and agglomeration. This was a valuable experience that offered students the opportunity to see the impact of gentrification and agglomeration. The level 3 Geography students also travelled to Muriwai beach to conduct important research for their upcoming assessment. Students believed this was "a great experience that gave us the opportunity to conduct research in a real world setting and allowed us to see a beach we had never been to before!." Later in the year, The Model United Nations Assembly saw two teams of Year 12 & 13 OHS students representing the countries of Cyprus and Syria. Taking part in debates and elections the students enjoyed the intellectual sparring and challenge of this annual event. This year students of senior History also had a number of visiting speakers to enrich their learning of cultures and the past. With second generation survivors from the Holocaust Centre of New Zealand as well as guests from Nigeria, China and India the students found that hearing from those who had lived experience of an event they were studying and the chance to question these people within an educational environment added value and understanding to what they were learning about.



Waka Hauora: Health and Guidance

What a year this has been! Despite the ups and downs 2021 sent our way, we managed to deliver all the same great services we usually provide - and some new ones...

We tested the vision of all junior students, and provided free prescription glasses for twenty-one young people. We are so grateful to the University of Auckland for this wonderful service, which even included delivering glasses to whānau who weren't able to be at school

Our relationship continues with the asthma bus, which comes once a term to support and educate students who experience asthma.

This year we also started providing immunisations at school, including MMR, Boostrix, and HPV. It was great to work with the DHB to offer this opportunity to our students.

We introduced LGBTeens, a social group for our LGBTQIA+ students and allies. We were excited to be joined by about 25 students and five staff members.

The Hauora Council

This council works as a student voice to take action on issues relating to the health and wellbeing of our school community. In Term Two the council worked with the Sports Council and LGBTeens to run the annual Pink Shirt Day, raising awareness about bullying in schools, as well as \$350 for charity. In Terms Two and Three we ran "Breakfast Club," providing a healthy breakfast and a positive start to the day for any students who wanted to join us.

Peer Support Leadership Program

We had a vibrant and outgoing group of Year 13 students train to become Peer Support Leaders this year. They spent time with their assigned Year 9 kaitiaki class twice a week for all of Term One. We were very proud to award Pakeeza Ali with the cup for Peer Support Leader of the Year.

Covid-19 response

We would like to acknowledge the hard work of our health team who rose to the challenges of the pandemic more than ever this year. Our nurses worked with the DHB to run a pop-up vaccination clinic in October for anyone to drop in and receive their Covid-19 shot, they advised on protection strategies upon our return to school, and they worked tirelessly alongside our senior leadership to ensure that school was a safe place for all of us.

PE and Health


Wero white water park



The students used the canapes they had designed for the evening and prepped large amounts of these for the night. The charity dinner raised over \$100,000 and our students played a significant role along with having an amazing and unique experience



Careers

Leaders of Tomorrow

24 of our Māori students had the opportunity to attend the 2021 Kei a Tātou te Ihi (KATTI) leadership day and 30 students The Pacific Island Leaders of Tomorrow programme (PILOT). As well as hearing from inspirational speakers and exploring tertiary study and career options, these days were a much enjoyed chance for whanaungatanga and building of networks. Kingston Moimoi commented "I enjoyed hearing other students' ideas on their futures - it was interesting hearing about what's even possible."

Researching Tertiary Study

Year 13s, considering study at university or polytechnic were invited to a range of interactive presentations to learn about the unique features of each place. Application support workshops were then held and trips to visit different options arranged. Students considering product design careers, for example, visited the Design department at AUT and those interested in Trades visited Mataaho at Unitec. Other students took up the opportunity to meet prospective employers and discuss apprenticeship possibilities at the 'Got a Trade Speedmeets' event.



Connecting the Classroom and the workspace

Seeing first hand how classroom learning is relevant in the workplace and what opportunities exist helps students make informed, inspired decisions. Our seniors interested in the Hospitality sector, for example, visited two restaurants, Ostro and Amano, to observe the many roles available in restaurants. They also visited Service Foods and learnt about many more job functions in the hospitality sector, including support roles in fields such as sales, logistics, IT and transport. Workplace exposure builds important connections, knowledge and confidence.

Career Insight Seminars

As well as over 280 students receiving personalised careers counselling, our weekly Careers Insights seminars helped students to deepen knowledge of different jobs, with guest speakers talking about their various occupations. Speakers are invited depending on what the Yr 13 areas of interest are - and this year guests ranged from architects to police officers to plumbers to landscape designers to occupational therapists to lawyers to even a helicopter loadmaster in the air force - and many more!





New in 2021

A new school wide Careers programme, 'Navigating Your Career' was created for students to research future career possibilities, explore resources, and learn more about what future employers might be looking for. This year also saw a great uptake in the newly offered lunchtime Jobseekers workshops. 64 proactive senior students wanting to find part-time jobs learnt tips on how and where to find work, and got help with CV writing and interview skills.

Drivers Licence Results

59 of our Year 13 students participated in a Road Code workshop and sat their learners licence test at school - with an impressive 100% pass rate! Comments from students such as Jesse Leilua, highlight just how important this achievement is "I'm thinking about a trade and getting a Drivers Licence will really improve my apprenticeship opportunities."


