It has been a happy year and I have enjoyed working with such a fine band of teachers and pupils. It has been an honour to lead Onehunga High School through 1967.

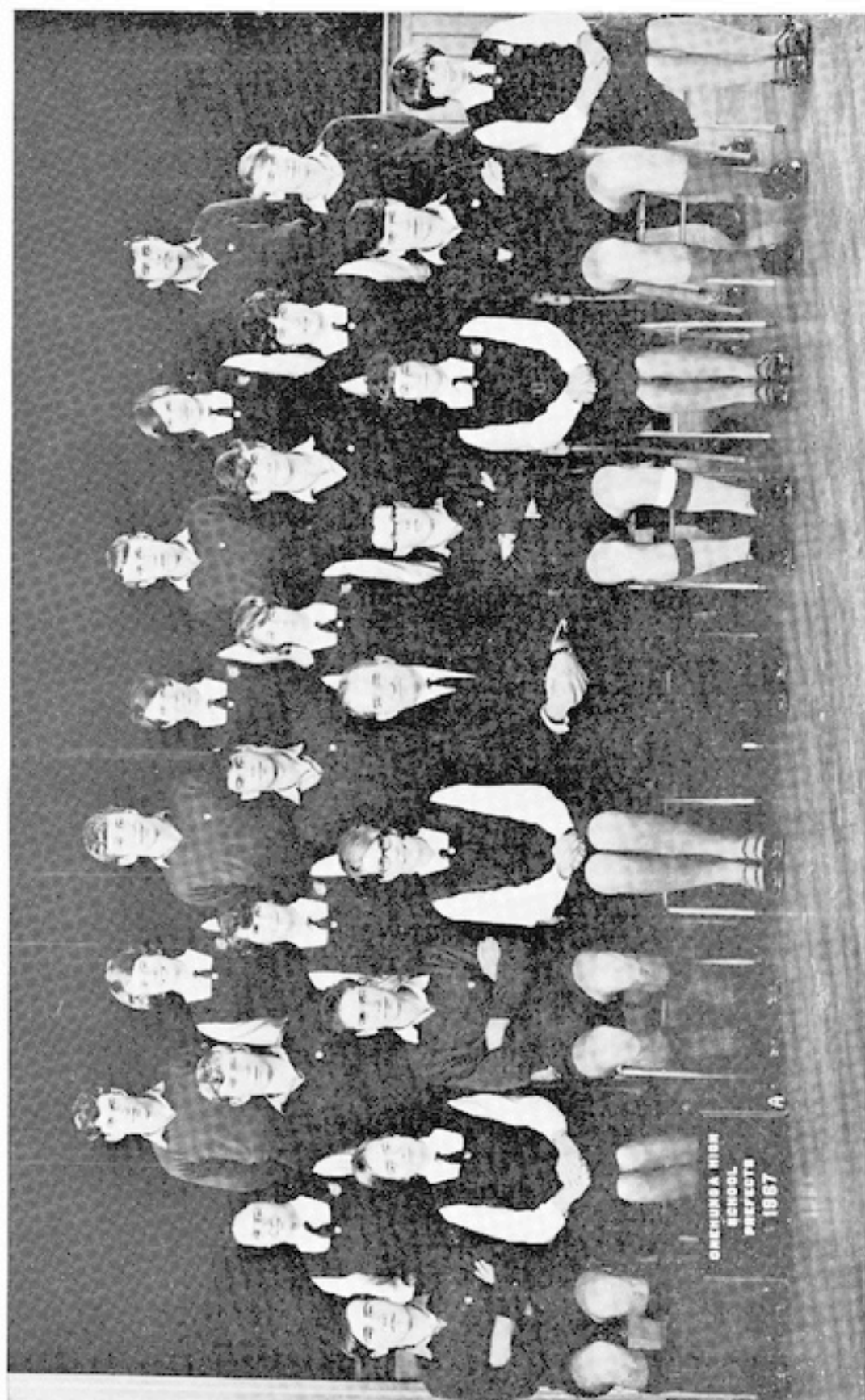
Our magazine records our struggle and happily lays emphasis on our bright spots.

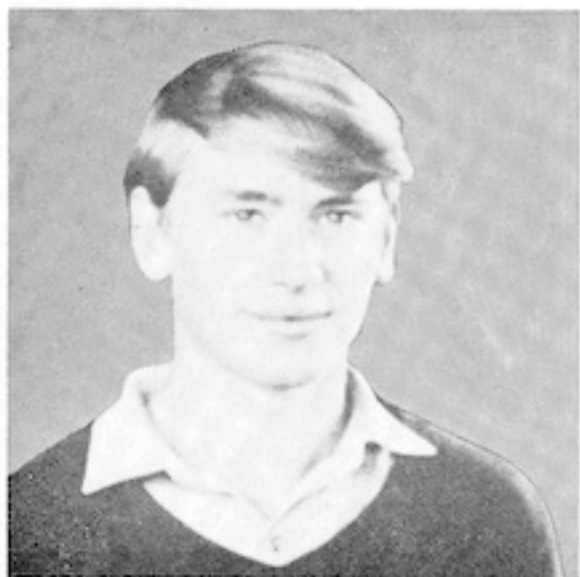
Anne L. Williams, 6B1:

"GOING FISHING"

Another cultural milestone in the history of the school was reached on the 21st, 22nd and 23rd September with the performance of "Going Fishing", an Operetta by Auckland Composer, Derrick Bailey with dialogue by Jack Butler. The producer was Mr Brian McKay and the musical direction was by Mrs Helen Woodmore. The first two performances were at the school and the last at Mahurangi College, Warkworth where the Operetta was originally produced. At Warkworth, we were made most welcome and treated with good old Northern hospitality. Seventy or more students and staff enjoyed the Great Trek there and back on the Saturday. It was complete with trucks, trailers, a bus and covered wagon.

Months of preparation and hard work on the part of pupils and staff went into this performance. The result was an outstanding show which brought large audiences and enthusiastic reception. Principals and chorus threw themselves keenly into the musical with its bright and attractive songs. "Going Fishing" demands considerable work backstage on lighting, sets and sound effects to keep the show moving and to allow those on stage to deliver of their best. Co-operation and co-ordination in these departments were evident in the smooth running of the show. However, the main credit belongs to Mr McKay and Mrs Woodmore whose co-operative efforts brought the acting and music to such a creditable level. Mr Bailey's splendid piano accompaniment gave the necessary musical impetus.

The theme of "Going Fishing" is tourism in N.Z. and the efforts of Peter O'Donnell and Bob McNab to establish a "fishing safari" from Taupo to the Bay of Islands. This required six scene changes and use of large numbers on stage, with carefully co-ordinated movement and chorus work. Principals were well cast. They very competently acted and sang with capable and well directed support from the chorus. This was not just a school production. It could have favourably been compared with any light musical production in Auckland.

Jim Datson as Peter O'Donnell and Barbara Davis as Sally Heisendecker provided the romantic interest. Duets are difficult to sing and they handled them with creditable skill.

Jennifer McCullough as Gladys and Richard Pipe as Heggarty handled their roles as the main comic characters with great gusto. They enjoyed their parts and so did the audience. Their songs, especially "London on a Saturday Night", were very popular.

Admiral Sir George Hardy was played with suitable aplomb by David Osborne who displayed a very promising bass-baritone. His enunciation was clear and precise. Raewyn Lipscombe was a sedate, dignified, Lady Hardy.

David Veart projected his personality well into the audience as Cyrus B. Heisendecker, a big Texan tourist with a big voice and bank

balance to go with it. Diane Parkes played his long suffering wife with the right touch of forbearance over his fishing mania.

John Pipe as Bob McNab, Jim Datson's business partner, had a very convincing, reliable Scots burr, an asset to any reputable business.

Smaller roles were well sustained by Elizabeth Woonton, Graeme Blackman, Glenda Fryer, Richard Bicknell (with an excellent boy soprano performance), Bruce Kirkland, Mark Dansby-Scott and Nigel Drake.

Air hostesses, pilots and navigators and Chorus are too numerous to mention individually in this limited space, but the whole performance was a fine example of what planned, co-operative effort by a large number of pupils and staff can produce.

EVENING SCHOOL

This year opened with 41 classes, an increase of five on last year. Basket-weaving, one of the new classes, proved to be very popular. The other new classes were all vocational ones. There were two new classes for Stage II for the Diploma of Business Management. Four classes, one in English, Biology, Geography and History were instituted for candidates preparing for School Certificate and University Entrance examinations.

The new, as well as the traditional classes, were satisfactorily supported. We believe that these new vocational classes are providing a service to the district that is needed and appreciated.

Next year we intend to institute further classes preparing for Stage III, the final stage required to obtain the Diploma of Business Management. For School Certificate and University Entrance candidates, we hope to provide a course in Mathematics in addition to the existing ones.

Thanks to the great support from the district, the school has been able to maintain existing classes and to institute new ones as they are required.

OUR TAHITIAN VISITORS

Once again the school had the pleasure of enrolling four visiting Tahitian students during the latter part of the second term. They were billeted in the homes of our pupils and lived and studied as members of the school for eight weeks.

There were 66 Tahitian pupils in the party that arrived by air on July 7th, as guests of 25 Auckland secondary schools. They came from the four 'Lycées' in Tahiti to spend their long vacation improving their English.

The party was accompanied by two teachers. The group was racially mixed: Chinese, Tahitian and French, but all were citizens of Tahiti, speaking a common language — French.

After a 35 minute delay at the Airport before their arrival, the large gathering of parents, pupils and teachers met their guests. Onehunga High was allocated two boys and two girls, and it wasn't long before the whole school knew these pleasant young people: Béatrice Coppenrath, Thérèse Roscol, Dominique Daguisse and Gerald Goltz.

Béatrice was the guest of Gay Matthews and was placed in 4L. Thérèse was the guest of Christine Barnett and placed in 3L. Dominique was with Ian Hunt and joined 6B2, while Gerard was billeted with Bruce Kirkland and joined 6B1.

We learnt much about the lives and interests of these young people in their homeland. Béatrice, aged 14, collects key rings and has a collection of over 200. Thérèse, also aged 14, has eight Alsatian dogs. 17-year-old Dominique has a keen interest in Marine life, while Gerard, the oldest member of the group at 19, has a deep interest in languages.

Our four guests, much to their delight, were outfitted with our distinctive school uniforms. This was a novel experience that provided them with an interesting topic of discussion in letters to their friends who are not familiar with this New Zealand practice.

July 14th, Bastille Day, was not overlooked — it was celebrated with a dance at Auckland University. Papatoetoe High sponsored another official evening during the course of the visit, but there were numerous gatherings of an unofficial nature to keep them entertained.

Our four visitors travelled extensively to see as much of the Auckland Province as they could be shown in the time allowed — one trip was so far afield as Opotiki. They were able to see a reasonable cross-section of New Zealand and its life.

September 1st came all too quickly and the majority of the party was winging its way home with fond memories and firm pledges to return 'someday'. We farewelled our four friends at the last school Assembly of the term when they went up onto the stage to say goodbye.

The last 15 members of the party left on the 8th September and another happy visit was over for these young Tahitian students.

We are pleased to learn that one of our pupils will be in the group of 30 New Zealand exchange pupils who will spend six weeks during the summer vacation in a Tahitian Lycee. Pauline Henderson, 6A, hopes to study at the Lycee Paul Gauguin and be billeted with her old friend, Hinanui Cave, who was Pauline's guest while at Onehunga in 1966.

AUSTRALIAN TRIP

Need it be said? The sixty pupils and four teachers of Onehunga High School who were privileged to tour Australia during the May holidays, had an unforgettable experience. It was a new and exciting adventure for most of us wingless Kiwis to fly from our small island home for a twelve day tour of the large neighbouring continent.

Amid much excitement we boarded the mighty Qantas V jet to wing our way smoothly across the Tasman to Sydney where we were soon delivered safely to our hotels in notorious King's Cross.

Our first impression of Sydney was of countless red brick "boxes" and swarming masses of people. However, that was soon superseded by the breathless beauty of its Harbour bridge, large parklands and reserves and the fantastic Opera House, which dominate the landscape. The first night saw most of the party enjoying the thrills of Luna Park, where we tried our hands successfully at roller coasting, although the boys were disappointed that our heavy-weights could not hold the last car of the coaster on the track. A few of us lingered in King's Cross

studying the night crowds and window shopping. It was here in King's Cross that we learnt to hazard pedestrian crossings — no "Barnes dance" to protect us — you just dodge the traffic if you can.

On Monday we set out on a long two day trek to Melbourne, the girls by way of the Princes Highway (the coast road) and the boys by way of the Hume Highway. Our one lasting impression of this journey will be of brown grass and scruffy looking sheep. It was here that we realised the importance of sheep in Australia's economy and learnt much of interest about sheep farming methods in Australia; for instance, how the Australian farmers cross their sheep with Kangaroos to produce woolly jumpers, and feed their sheep with iron pellets to get wire wool (could this be just another tall story?).

A stop at Canberra enabled us to view the beauty of Australia's Federal Capital, its many diplomatic Mansions and its imposing War Memorial.

Arriving in Melbourne on Tuesday evening, we were quickly settled in our respective hotels in St. Kilda. Here every second shop seemed to be an Italian restaurant (And couldn't they make Pizza pie!). We were able to travel to Melbourne by either fast, efficient but grubby electric trains, or by tram — an experience in itself! You take your stand in the middle of the road and wave frantically at the driver. If you're in luck the tram stops; if not the driver waves back and continues on his way.

Two days of excellent shopping in Melbourne saw us all "stoney broke." Like all good Kiwi sheep we were well "fleeced." It was here at the Sir Colin MacKenzie Wild Life Sanctuary that we saw our first live Kangaroos, Koalas, Snakes, Platypuses and other interesting local fauna. In the evening the boys raced their slot cars at the tracks, while the girls spent time developing their talents at ice skating.

Early Saturday morning it was back to Sydney, each group taking the alternative route. To break the monotony of travel we learnt traditional Maori songs which were sung to all the Australians we met. Our knowledgeable coach driver informed us that there are over 500 species of gum trees. One species is called the "dumb dog," because "it hasn't any bark." (OH BOY).

It was back in Sydney that we swayed to the roll of a double decker bus. The boys say that the breath-taking roll was caused by our own heavy-weights: seated on the same side upstairs. Here our evenings were occupied by hotly contested slot car races or ten-pin bowling at one of the many magnificent alleys.

Now for a few of our last memorable experiences; our first ride in a Sydney taxi (You just close your eyes and pray), the frightening speed of the traffic; a night ride across the Harbour bridge; Car dealer showrooms which house the undamaged species of Aussie car (so different from the battered models on the road); the smooth riding trains with their efficient dining-car service; the knowledgeable good humoured coach captains and lastly, an enormous departmental store in Melbourne (our biggest might cover its ground floor!)

It was a grand trip; we will not forget it easily.

THE KUALA LUMPUR TRIP 1967

A small, but enthusiastic group of Onehunga High School boys left on the 16th of August for a 17 day Pacific cruise. Mr Van Sambeek accompanied them.

The initial feeling of strangeness on board ship soon disappeared through the friendliness of the crew and of the boys from other schools.

The trip was well organised. On the days at sea there were instructions from the masters and some officers; visits to the engine room and bridge; and at night there were films, sometimes housie with beautiful prizes, and one night the ship's band played especially for the boys. Mr Woo, the Chief Steward for the boys, was the most popular crew member. Not on the programme, but very amusing all the same, was a pillow-fight the first night on board.

We made some great trips to Mosquito Island, the Navua River where we travelled in small boats with outboard engines through the rapids to Nuku Village in the middle of a tropical rain-forest.

A dance, organised by the girls from St. Joseph's Secondary School, took place on the last night in Suva. The next day we left, farewelled by several hundred of our dancing partners of the previous night.

During the last days on board, everybody studied carefully the customs regulations to find out how much there would be to pay on arrival. On our arrival, the customs officials were very co-operative, helpful, and showed great sympathy.

Our trip was a real success and well worth saving up for.

RUGBY VISIT TO WAIHEKE

On Saturday, 10th July, during the mid-term break, a composite 3rd and 4th grade team travelled to Waiheke to play the Waiheke D.H.S. team. The visit was made with the view of giving the Waiheke boys an opportunity to play a competitive game against an outside team. There was no problem selecting a team to travel, since it offered the chance of a pleasant sea journey and a look at the beautiful island.

After a pleasant trip down the harbour, our boys were met by their hosts and transported by bus to the District High School. After a stimulating morning tea, they took their places on the field against a team of boys of all sizes and shapes. With a roll of only 63 boys, Waiheke was limited in their selections. Although Onehunga obtained a massive score of 46, the opposition managed to score two spectacular tries, with a final score of 8. Mr Gee and Mr Lee who accompanied the team reported favourably on the hospitality of their hosts. It is hoped that a return match can be arranged sometime in the future.

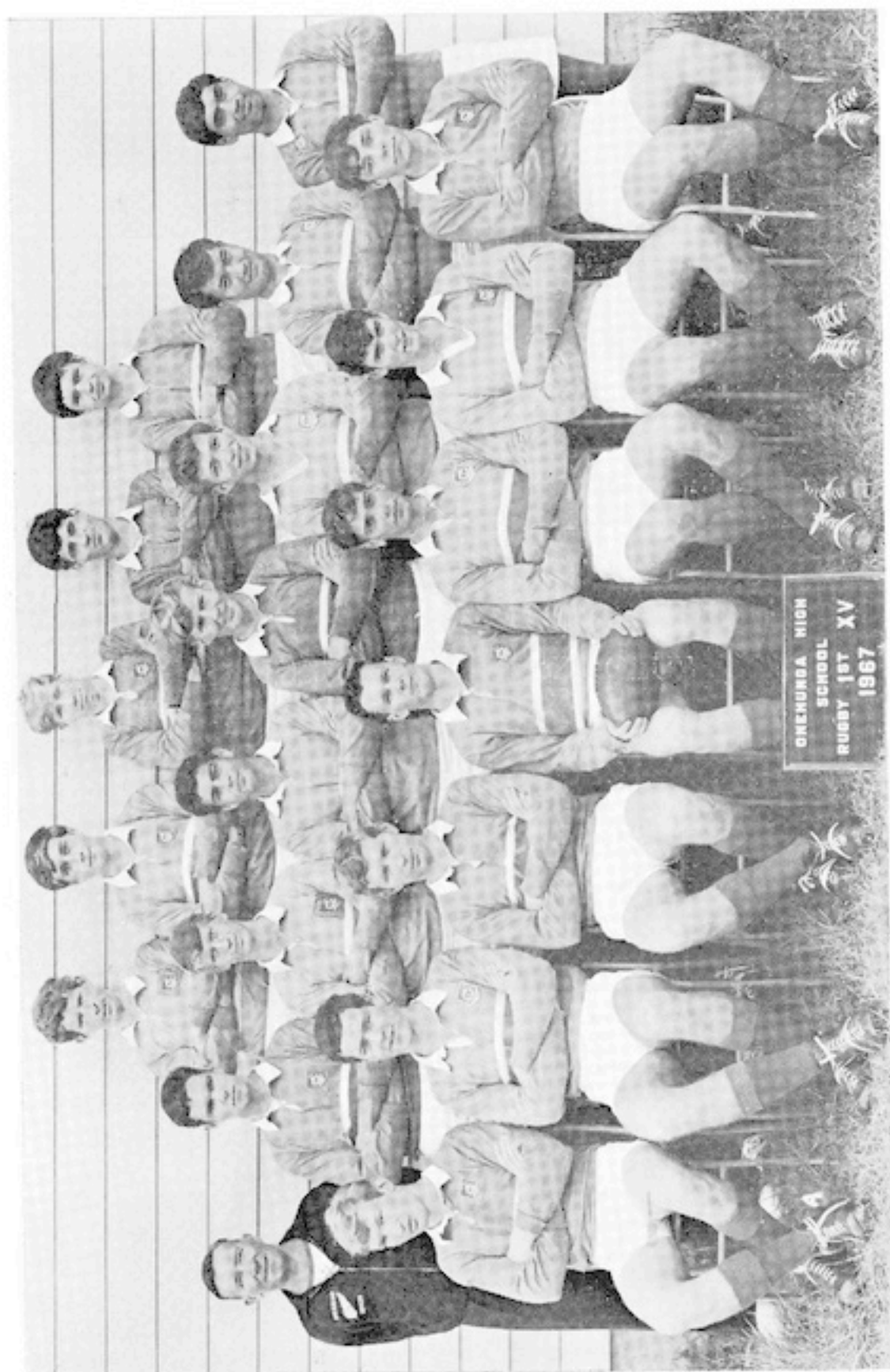

IS NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT ESSENTIAL TO WORLD PEACE?

Extra Award: Serious Prose

There have been countless discussions about the necessity for nuclear disarmament in the interests of world peace, but all have been fruitless. The only result has been a test-ban treaty signed by the U.S., Russia and Britain, but this could be broken by any one of the signatories if it were expedient in their bid for power. The world is, therefore, faced with an unanswerable question; Is nuclear disarmament possible? Is it the only guarantee of peace?

Professor Hans J. Morgenthau of the University of Chicago gets to the crux of the problem when he says:

"The modern philosophy of disarmament proceeds from the assumption that men fight because they have arms." Is this true? He goes on to say; "Men do not fight because they have arms. They have arms because they deem it necessary to fight." If you do not agree with this statement, look at the world scene. You will observe the war now being fought in Vietnam. Why is this war being fought? Simply because some power-seeking nation is pursuing its dreams, using war as a means of acquiring the power they seek. The more up-to-date the weapons used, the greater the advantage, and the more likely they are to achieve their goal. Thus we see that Professor Morgenthau's statement is not only true, but also logical. Can this, we ask, mean that all disarmament conferences are doomed to failure because man will fight on regardless of such agreements? It unfortunately appears so.

But, it is said, there is always a first time for everything. What stands in the way of this "first time"? Just what is the problem?

Trust seems to be the major problem. Can one nation trust another? If a nuclear disarmament was agreed to, could one nation be sure that the other was completely disarmed? The Russians have repeatedly expressed a willingness to accept total nuclear disarmament, but are unwilling to permit any inspection. Needless to say, the Western Allies cannot bring themselves to trust Soviet Russia. In 1963,

the British delegate to the Geneva Disarmament Conference pointed out that even if Soviet Russia did agree to total nuclear disarmament with inspection, they could not be sure that the Russians had not hidden 10% to 20% of their fissionable material. The United States, meanwhile, is left with two agonising decisions: should they dispose of all their nuclear weapons and trust the Russians; or should they retain as much of their own material as possible? This brings us back to the original problem of trust and makes us realise the unlikelihood of it. This problem must be solved or mankind is likely to destroy itself.

The late President Kennedy said: "Together we shall save our planet — or together we shall perish in its flames!" To bring about this togetherness which is required, men must learn to live peacefully with one another. This in turn requires trust. Former President Eisenhower said in his inaugural address: "For this truth must be clear before us: Whatever America hopes to bring to pass in the world must first come to pass in the heart of America." This statement implies that, in America — as in every nation — the heart, the character of men, must be changed if we are to have world peace. This is paralleled by a statement by the late General Douglas MacArthur in his historic address before the assembled Congress of the United States after his withdrawal from Korea. He said: "I know war as few other men now living know it, and nothing to me — and nothing to me is more revolting . . . Men since the beginning of time have sought peace . . . Military alliances, balances of power, League of Nations, all in turn failed, leaving the only path to be by the crucible of war. The utter destructiveness of war now blocks this alternative. We have had our last chance. If we will not devise some greater and equitable system, our Armageddon will be at our door. The problem basically is theological and involves a revival of religious faith and improvement of human character that will synchronize with our almost matchless advances in science, art, literature and all the material and cultural developments of the past two thousand years. "It must be of the spirit if we are to save the flesh." There must be a moral reformation, a change of character in the people and the rulers of the world. Without this change the world is heading for war and probable annihilation of life. Meanwhile the arms race continues, described by Dr H. H. York of the University of California as a "steady open spiral down towards oblivion." To quote Dean Acheson "This world is going to be dangerous to live in."

But why do nations arm in the first place? Professor Morgenthau said: "Nations arm either because they want to defend themselves against other nations, or because they want to attack them. All politically active nations are by definition engaged in a competition for power." This struggle for power must be resolved, the only way still open to us being by way of the conference table, but before this can be rendered effective a change in basic human character must come about. Men seeking world power will never agree to a peaceful world under someone else. War is no solution. It never has, or ever will resolve this struggle. Professor Morgenthau continues: "Without political settlement, disarmament has no chance for success."

Is disarmament really a way to peace? No! First we must have a change in basic human character, then we will have trust, then a political settlement, peace, and finally total nuclear disarmament. Disarmament then is a result of peace, not a way to it.

LEGALISED MURDER

For every death from injury in the prize ring, there are hundreds incapacitated; many young men have had their brains permanently damaged. Their cases get no publicity, but they are the victims of the occupational disease of all boxers, punch-drunkenness.

Research carried out at the University of Chicago reveals the damage that boxing caused to the brain. The brain weighs only about 3lbs. and floats freely in liquid within the skull. This means that only a light blow to any part of the head can cause a considerable impact against the skull wall, in turn causing bruising and perhaps bleeding. Brain injuries do not heal and permanent damage is done to the brain cells. This can cause deterioration in thinking powers, speech and emotional stability. Many boxers end up in asylums and hospitals. All boxers suffer some brain damage whether it be minor or severe.

Prize-fighting should be abolished. This view is supported by many instructors of physical education and anyone who has given this subject serious study.

One world champion told a reporter that he would rather knock his opponent out in the first round than see him receiving hard blows throughout a prolonged fight.

Surely no civilised person would enjoy seeing this kind of brutality.

What is a problem child? Fear is another factor present in many problem children, whether it is fear of the dark, animals or crowds. If not realised, the fear could persist and the child, in later years, could form nervous habits and feel insecure.

Perhaps when a five-year-old begins school, he is constantly worried by a bully; he is afraid to go to school and feels alone in the world. Even if this bully does not persist, the child's experience may have had a permanent effect on both his home and school life.

I think, if parents took more interest in their children's problems, and learnt to recognise emotionally disturbed children whether they are bullies, quick-tempered, or withdrawn, there wouldn't be so many problem children.

SHOULD THE VOTING AGE BE LOWERED TO EIGHTEEN?

The present age at which a person is entitled to vote, if he is not a convicted criminal or mentally defective and if he is a New Zealand citizen, is twenty-one. This seems a satisfactory age, but many people have been clamouring for the voting age to be lowered to twenty or even eighteen. The former was part of the Labour Party's 1966 election manifesto. The question which must be asked is: are all people of eighteen responsible citizens, responsible enough to vote? There are many sides to this question worthy of consideration.

Whereas many young people of eighteen are mature, responsible, upright citizens, there is a certain section that is just the opposite. Such people, who could be easily swayed in their opinion by an undesirable organisation offering ridiculous election promises which would appeal to this type, could quite easily have this party elected to power with grave consequences for New Zealand and perhaps the rest of the world. It is impossible in elections to discriminate between those who are mature and those who are not in our democratic system.

The cry is raised that young people mature at a much earlier age than their forefathers who made twenty-one the voting age and the age of entry into adulthood. Yet recently a Dunedin magistrate, Mr D. J. Murray, said that although young people reached a level of intellectual adjustment at an earlier age, this was not the same thing as reaching maturity.

People of eighteen to twenty often do not have a reasonable and responsible outlook (even though many of them are sure that they themselves do). Many are absolutely lacking in any real knowledge of politics. As a National Party candidate said in late 1966, even the Labour Party's idea of reducing the age to twenty is ridiculous, as even at this age many people are "ignorant regarding politics." These people do not stop to think and meditate about political parties and political situations; they tend to listen to and believe the political sensationalists who make big issues out of small matters. Perhaps this eagerness is a good thing in some ways, as this reflects the politics of earlier times, which of course, although vigorous, was often detrimental to a nation's economy and security.

Many young people and some of the older generation, regard politics as a 'game', but in modern times it is becoming more serious.

These people seldom realize that their choice of the polling booth will ultimately change their destiny and that of their country.

Most factors point to the tradition of twenty-one as the voting age remaining. It could possibly be lowered to twenty, but should not go down to eighteen.

After all, we have to draw the line somewhere and there does not seem any real point in lowering the age to twenty. Twenty-one is a significant age on anyone's life, and that voting age should remain, for the good of the voter and New Zealand.

THE MYSTERY OF THE AURORAS

One of the most fascinating and baffling phenomena of the heavens are the "auroras".

An aurora may be simply defined as a luminosity of the night sky, usually seen in the Arctic and Antarctic regions. The display to the north is known as "aurora borealis," and the one to the south as "aurora australis." An aurora may consist of shimmering patches of light. A rare form of aurora is the corona which appears close to the zenith. In most auroral displays the light is greenish white, but in more spectacular displays it may be green, yellow, or red. In some cases the light forms are stationary while in others they change in position, intensity, or colour. The physical activity that causes auroras, presumably, has been occurring for hundreds of millions of years. An aurora is caused by the sun which bombards the earth with billions of light waves and minute electrified particles.

There have been several references to the auroras in historical writings. The Roman philosopher, Seneca, who lived during the time of Christ, mentioned the "lights" in his "Natural Questions."

Many interesting facts have been discovered about the auroras. It has been found, for example, that frequency of auroral displays follows closely the frequency of sunspots. There is an eleven year cycle of auroras corresponding to an eleven year cycle of sunspots. Particularly vivid auroral displays occur simultaneously with changes in the magnetism of the earth. These changes are called "magnetic storms."

The mutual relation between sunspots and auroras has led to the belief that auroras appear because of some activity on the sun. The exact nature of this activity has not been found out.

One theory assumes that electrified particles or "corpuscles", are driven outward from the sun by violent explosions, and that they move in narrow beams at a high velocity through space. Some of the beams travel towards the earth. It is supposed that the beams are deflected by the earth's magnetic field toward the north and south magnetic poles and that some of the particles follow a curved course which conducts them into the atmosphere on the dark side of the earth. Here, they produce an auroral display at high altitudes.

The second theory holds the cause to be the flashing forth of intense ultra-violet light from the sun. When these short waves of light penetrate the atmosphere, they ionize its gases (knock electrons from their molecules), which are then driven outward to great distances. When the ultra-violet light ceases, the ions (incomplete molecules of gas) fall back towards the earth and are deflected towards the polar regions by the earth's magnetic field where they somehow produce auroras.

The manner by which auroras are created may never be solved but the wonder of them cannot be denied.
